The test has been passed for you

Dear Friends,

I have been talking a lot about grace lately in the traditional services. I came across this story about grace today and thought I would share it with you.

I left work early so I could have some uninterrupted study time right before the final in my Youth Issues class. When I got to class, everybody was doing their last-minute studying. The teacher came in and said he would review with us for just a little bit before the test. We went through the review, most of it right out of the study guide, but there were some things he was reviewing that I had never heard of. When

questioned about it, he said that they were in the book and we were responsible for everything in the book. We couldn't really argue with that.

Finally, it was time to take the test.

"Leave them face down on the desk until everyone has one, and I'll tell you to start," our prof instructed.

When we turned them over, every answer on the test was filled in! The bottom of the last page said the following:

"This is the end of the Final Exam. All the answers on your test are correct. You will receive an 'A' on the final exam. The reason you passed the test is because the creator of the test took it for you. All the work you did in preparation for this test did not help you get the 'A.' You have just experienced ... grAce."

He then went around the room and asked each student individually, "What is your grade? Do you deserve the grade you are receiving? How much did all your studying for this exam help you achieve your final grade?"

Now I am not a crier by any stretch of the imagination, but I had to fight back tears when answering those questions and thinking about how the Creator has passed the test for me.

Discussion afterward went like this: "I have tried to teach you all semester that you are a recipient of grace. I've tried to communicate to you that you need to demonstrate this gift as you work with young people. Don't hammer them; they are not the enemy. Help them, for they will carry on your ministry if it is full of GRACE!"

The teacher said he had never done this kind of final before and probably would never do it again, but because of the content of many of our class discussions, he felt like we needed to experience grace.

Do you need Safe Sanctuary training?

Are you volunteering this school year in **Sunday School**, **SPLASH**, **SPLISH SPLASH**, **IMPACT**, **Student Ministry**, or **KIDS JAM Children's Choir**? St. Peter's requires all volunteers to have two references, a background check, and mandatory training on our Safe Sanctuary policies before they can participate in a ministry. We take the safeguarding of our preschoolers, children, youth, special needs children, and senior adults seriously. To ensure all volunteers have met the requirements to work with children, we are providing three training sessions to choose from: **Aug. 2**, **at 9:30 a.m.**, **Aug. 6 at 12:30 p.m.**, **and Aug. 9 at 6:30 p.m.**

Please plan to attend one of these sessions if you are volunteering or even thinking about volunteering in an area that involves any of the above groups. Completing the screening process ahead of time gives our ministry teams a group of volunteers who are available at any time to help and ensures St. Peter's stays in compliance with our Safe Sanctuary policy. Background checks and training are good for one year. If you are unable to attend, we have an online training video you will be required to watch followed by a test. A Week With Richard: U.M. ARMY 2017

The following is a post by Student Ministry Director Jason Trice on his blog Pocket Toast.

've experienced a lot of change in the past year. It's been good change, but change nonetheless. That's one reason I was looking forward to U.M. ARMY this summer. While each camp is different, there is one thing that I can always count on being the same—God shows up in BIG ways. This year He did again.

For those who don't know, U.M. ARMY is a weeklong mission trip for high school students. I first attended in 1994 when I was 16 years old, and I fell in love



with the organization. I had yet to give my life to Christ at that point, but I believe U.M. ARMY is responsible for teaching me the value of service. I actually skipped the camp my first opportunity to go because it sounded boring to me, and I decided I would rather play baseball. In 1994 my friends wouldn't let me miss it. They couldn't stop talking about how much fun they had, so I decided to give it a try. That is when I learned that serving is a gift to both the receiver and the giver.

Since the summer of '94 was more than a few years ago, I have played just about every role that you can at U.M. ARMY. My favorite role and the one I try to get every year is Work Team Adult. This allows me to work closely with students and to build a relationship with the person whose home we are working on. This year we were sent to the home of a man named Richard.

Richard came out of his home when he saw the van pull into his yard. He walked with me around the house, and we discussed the work that we would do. The house belonged to his mother, and he was taking care of her. Due to his own challenges and the responsibilities of taking care of his 99-year-old mother, the house had become overgrown with ivy. In fact, the entire property was overgrown and resembled what I like to call the East Texas Amazon. It was a jungle.

We had a huge work team, and Richard had enough to keep all 12 of us busy. After only three hours of work, the place already looked different. As we peeled away the ivy, the red brick began to shine through. It was fun to see such progress on our first day.

When we came back on Tuesday, Richard greeted us again. He was walking a little more upright, and he seemed excited to see the team. Richard began to share parts of his life with us, and he has an incredible story. The first thing that you notice when you pull up to his house is that he has a small obsession with boats. He has 17 of them sitting in his front yard. He originally bought them in hopes of having them restored, but taking care of his mother took precedence, and the boats began to deteriorate and were covered by brush, ivy, and small trees.

Each day we cleared more and more land. And guess what? We found four more boats. He had 21. It's not every day you find a boat doing yard work, much less four. Richard insisted he only had 17, so we didn't correct him, but that gave the team a good laugh.

By Wednesday, we had all grown to love Richard. He began to tell us the good and the bad of his 76-year journey. It was clear that life had thrown a lot at Richard. He has survived cancer, a stroke, the loss of his company, and a huge heartbreak. You could tell that he was enjoying watching our team. In fact, he joined us in the Texas heat to help us transform his yard.

On Wednesday I invited Richard to join us for a U.M. ARMY tradition. We asked if he would be willing to have dinner and worship with us on Thursday night. He said he would love to, and then he immediately left to run an errand. When he returned, he told me he went to get a haircut so he would look presentable in church. It was just a haircut, but something in Richard was different. He didn't look like the same man who shook my hand on Monday morning. He was smiling and appeared more confident.

On Thursday, we got rained out. Each group participated in small projects around the community that were indoors, and we were unable to visit Richard. We remained hopeful that he would still join us for dinner and worship despite the poor weather.

Sure enough, he arrived right at 6:00. Our team of 12 squeezed around the table and laughed and visited together with Richard. It's a scene that only a camp like U.M. ARMY can create. A 76-year-old man dining with 11 teenagers from all over Texas that he met only four days ago. We enjoyed our dinner and then headed upstairs for worship.

I sat next to Richard, and I cannot tell you how it impacted me to hear him singing hymns of praise to our great God. We sang "Amazing Grace," "Come Thou Fount," and "It Is Well." Richard sang every word, and I could tell that the Holy Sprit was moving in him. After the service, I walked him out.

Before we got to the door, Richard began to speak. He told me that he had been at the end of his rope and was ready to give up. He said he was embarrassed to have people come over, and he had become a shut-in. He told me that this week had given him a new lease on life.

I looked at Richard as tears began to stream down his face and told him thank you. I told him how grateful we were that he allowed us to share this week with him and that he had blessed us in so many ways.

This is what happens at U.M. ARMY. God put the perfect team together to send to Richard. He knew the personalities and the gifts that were needed. I also believe he knew how much we needed Richard.

Philippians 2:3-4 says, "Don't be selfish; don't try to impress others. Be humble, thinking of others as better than yourselves. Don't look out only for your own interests, but take an interest in others, too."

Both Richard and my team of 11 teenagers modeled humility all week long. I believe that when we find humility, we meet with Jesus. It's where he is able to get our whole attention and give us a glimpse of the Kingdom.

Thank you U.M. ARMY for another awesome week! God is good!
