



Overview

The Book of Malachi is the last book of the Old Testament in the Christian Bible. Estimated to have been written around the late 5th century BC, during the post-exilic period, Malachi addresses moral and spiritual deterioration, religious apathy, and social injustice. The prophet Malachi primarily directs his message towards the priests and people, challenging their behavior and calling them to repentance.

The book is structured as a series of dialogues between God and the people of Israel, where God confronts them with their shortcomings and demands a genuine commitment to faith and obedience. Several key themes emerge throughout the book:

Faithfulness and Love of God: Malachi emphasizes God's love for His people and reminds them of His covenantal relationship with Israel. Despite the unfaithfulness of the people, God remains faithful and longs for their repentance.

It serves as a reminder of the importance of faithfulness, righteousness, and genuine worship in the eyes of God, emphasizing the need for a true and sincere relationship with Him. The book concludes the Old Testament on a note of anticipation for the coming Messiah, setting the stage for the events that unfold in the New Testament.

Reading Plan

Day 1: Read Malachi 1-2

Reflect on the prophecies of judgment against Israel and Judah for their sins.

Day 2: Read Malachi 3-4

Contemplate the rebuke of the corrupt leaders and false prophets. Explore the prophecy of the future glory of Zion and the reign of the Lord over the nations.

Day 3: Read Malachi 5-6

Reflect on the promise of a coming ruler from Bethlehem and the future restoration of Israel. Focus also on God's case against Israel, His desire for justice, and the call to live righteously.

Day 4: Read Malachi 7

Contemplate the prophet's lament and hope for God's mercy and forgiveness towards His repentant people.

Bible Study

Day 1 - Malachi 1

- What was the spiritual condition of the people during the time of Malachi's prophecy?
- In what ways can we relate to the issues faced by the people in Malachi's time?
- What was God's concern about the offerings brought by the people?
- Are there areas in your life where you struggle to give God your best? How can you improve in those areas?

Day 2 - Malachi 2

- What were the issues of spiritual leadership during Malachi's time, and how did it affect the people? How can leaders today learn from the mistakes of the priests in Malachi's day?
- What role do we play in supporting and praying for our spiritual leaders?
- How can we apply the principles of faithfulness, integrity, and reconciliation in our relationships?
- In what ways can we demonstrate God's love to those experiencing brokenness and pain in their marriages or relationships?

Day 3 - Malachi 3

- Who is the messenger mentioned in this passage, and what significance does he have in God's plan?
- What does the refining process symbolize, and how does it relate to our lives as believers. In what areas do you need God's refining and purifying work in your life?
- How did the people rob God, and what were the consequences of their actions? How can we apply the principles of tithing, giving, and stewardship in our lives today?

Day 4 - Malachi 4

- What is the day of the Lord, and what does it mean for believers?
- How does the promise of God's coming restoration encourage us during difficult times?
- How can we prepare ourselves for the day of the Lord while living in the present?

Key Themes

The book of Malachi addresses issues of faithfulness, social justice, and ethical conduct among the people of Israel. It calls for repentance, warns of the coming Day of the Lord, and promises restoration for those who turn back to God. Ultimately, Malachi's message reminds the people of Israel of their need to remain faithful to God and His covenant.

The Day of the Lord
